players, Lister and Smith said they decided not to run for fear the bull would charge after them. "I wasn't going to move," Smith said.

The crowd was also entertained by the comedy of Rooster Kersten and his pet llama and Marty Martek as he posed as Rambo between the bronc riding, steer wrestling, bull riding, barrel racing and calf roping events.
